3. Approval of September 7, 2021 Minutes

4a. TIP Amendment

VTrans requested this TIP Amendment be included for TAC action. The project, Charlotte Rail Bridge over Thorp Brook, is part of the work that needs to be done for the Amtrak extension to Burlington. Andrea would like more than just a repair project, the embankments are eroding, the culvert is undersized, this is an opportunity to do more and look at it in a comprehensive way. Lewis Creek Association advocated that the Town get involved because of the need for properly sized culverts. Dierdre asked if the TAC could approve the amendment procedurally and then address those issues later? Andrea notes that it's not just a water quality issue, but also erosion and structure size. There's nothing we can really do but bring it to people's attention. Matthew pointed out the cost, it's about \$570,000 to replace the culvert, but to replace with a structure would likely cost more than \$2 million, which VTrans doesn't have, but there

54 are some Western Corridor earmark funds that could potentially be available. Andrea asked about compliance by the railroad with stormwater and who is going to push for the improvements. Matthew said the state is responsible for the land beneath the railroad tracks, the railroad company is in charge of the tracks. Andrea asked if there's a way to get the railroad company to pay for the improvements. SAM ANDERSEN MADE A MOTION THAT THE TAC APPROVE THE PROPOSED TIP AMENDMENTS, SECONDED BY ROBIN PIERCE. THE MOTION PASSED WITH ANDREA MORGANTE ABSTAINING.

5. Animating Infrastructure Grant Program and VTrans Art Installation Guidance

Michele Bailey, Vermont Arts Council, and Jackie Cassino, VTrans, presented information about the Animating Infrastructure Grant Program and the VTrans Policy and process for Art Installations on State Transportation Facilities. Michele provided background on and numerous examples of using art and creative placemaking to demonstrate that people and places are valued, to animate local infrastructure, to enhance local economies, engage in civic dialogue, enhance public health, create educational and community engagement opportunities, and more. Sam asked if there will be a press release or other communication with municipalities. Michele said there will be direct outreach in October and November. Justin sees great benefits from public art in South Burlington, which requires projects of a certain size to include funding for art components, as does Burlington. These projects engage the community, showcase public infrastructure, and tend to generate foot traffic. He asked TAC members to consider how to include art components in local policies and budgets. Michele notes that pop up projects are a way to start small, build local interest, then go bigger. Jonathon asked if grant funds could be used to pay for both art and infrastructure, such as covered bike parking. Michele said the funds are only for the artist but there might be a possibility depending on the project, the Vermont Arts Council is interested in new ideas. The Better Places grant program might also be a funding source. Bob pointed out that AARP also has funding for place-making and Michele said AARP has another grant round coming up, as well as a fall workshop October 28-29. Guidelines and application for the Animating Infrastructure Grant Program are available now, with letters of interest due in December, and invitations for 8-10 full proposals to follow. More

Jackie presented installation guidance from VTrans for permanent installations. They are getting more requests thanks to the Vermont Arts Council programs. There is a three-phase application process, and applications are accepted on a rolling basis. There's no timeframe because each project is different so there's a need to be flexible. Justin commended VTrans's response to the public's expectations and their quick turnaround. Art is important in South Burlington and this is a great step forward to have the process developed so quickly. Bryan commented on the illuminated train art on the Waterbury bridge and asked if it's okay to have art illuminated on a state highway. Jackie said yes, it's an option. Bryan asked if art could be installed on bridge abutments as those can be good gateways to a community, and yes that's a possibility. 6. Greenride Bikeshare Update

Bryan Davis, CCRPC, and Mark Johnson, Bolt Mobility, provided an update on the expansion of Greenride Bikeshare and conversion to electric assist bikes. Bryan provided background on the history, partners, planning, funding and launch of the initial bikeshare system in 2018, and the system expansion and conversion to electric assist bikes in 2021. Mark shared data trends of the new system, pointing out the positive ridership impacts of summer months and college/university students returning to campus. Bryan Osborne asked if there's a way to track recreational use versus transportation trips. Bryan Davis said that we can look at the hub usage as one tool, and the team continues to push the system as a transportation option. Mark notes that location and time of day are other datasets to inform those discussions. He also noted the impacts of the labor shortage and supply chains as factors in getting the full

system deployed. Bryan Osborne asked about the operating season, and Mark replied that it's a yearround system but that the fleet would likely be reduced during the winter. He also talked about how he manages big snowstorms, by pulling bikes out of the system before a storm, shoveling out the stations, then redeploying the bikes. Bryan Osborne asked about the system financials compared to the first system, which was locally funded. Mark said that Bolt currently funds the system, there have been some grant funds, and in the future Bolt will seek local station sponsors to expand the system. Bryan Osborne asked how success is measured, and Mark said by increased ridership and increased members. Sandy also noted the positive impact of bikesharing on vehicle parking demand. Sam said she was impressed with the amount of work this takes, and that the business community and employment hubs would be great locations for stations, especially for New Americans and others with limited access to employment. Mark said he agrees. Jonathon asked about virtual hubs, and Mark said those are created by geofencing existing public or private racks so that they show up on the system app as places where people can park bikes without incurring a fee. Jonathon asked if more racks could be added to station hubs for people to park their own bikes. Mark said that stations have extra capacity built in and could discuss allowing private bikes to be parked at them, and there would need to be a way to indicate that it is okay for people to park there. There was a question about the financial sustainability and profitability, and while Mark didn't have that information he indicated that Bolt is pleased with the system usage so far. Jason asked how bikes are charged, and Mark said that users can see battery charge levels using the app, as can he, and he carries extra batteries with him to swap in the field and recharge at the warehouse. Jason pointed out that the existing system boundary doesn't include St Michaels College and asked if it had been considered. Mark said he agrees with some boundary changes and will pursue.

7. Vermont Project Selection and Prioritization Process (VPSP2) – Review Statewide Potential Project List and Provide Comments e

Christine Forde, CCRPC, reviewed the memo in the agenda packet, which shows the Chittenden County projects recommended by VTrans for funding, as well as those for later consideration, on the Statewide Potential Project Lists for Paving, Roadway, and Traffic & Safety. The implementation schedule hasn't been determined but all projects are funded. The TAC is being asked to review the project lists and provide comments to VTrans. The memo includes some suggested comments by CCRPC staff for projects in the "Later Consideration" category. Jonathon asked why there's no funding for the Essex Junction multimodal station. Christine noted this particular project is for circulation at the station, and the Village is interested in the building structure. There's more thinking needed for what needs to be done. VTrans may apply for a grate for station upgrades statewide, which would include this facility. Wayne asked about the VT117/Skunk Hollow Road project and whether it was to replace a culvert, which it is not. Previous thinking was to realign the intersection, or fix the slope to improve visibility. JUSTIN RABIDOUX MOVED THAT THE TAC RECOMMEND COMMENTS PREPARED BY STAFF WITH EDITS TO BE SUBMITTED TO VTRANS FOR CONSIDERATION IN THE VPSP2 PROCESS. THE MOTION WAS SECONDED BY SAM ANDERSEN AND APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY.

8. TAC Volunteer to serve on Long Range Planning Committee (Action Item – 5 min)

CCRPC requests a TAC volunteer to serve on the Long Range Planning Committee to assist with the ECOS Plan Update. Representatives from the CWAC, TAC & PAC would benefit the process, expected from Sept/Oct 2021 to March/April 2023. The biggest committee engagement is anticipated to be in 2022.

FY 2023 Unified Planning Work Program

Background and Process:

The CCRPC develops a <u>Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)</u> to serve as the annual work plan for local and regional transportation projects and other planning activities. Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) are required to develop UPWPs to govern work programs for the expenditure of FHWA and FTA planning funds. Updated annually, the CCRPC's UPWP describes our numerous programs and identifies the transportation, land use and other planning activities and projects that the CCRPC is engaged in collaboration with its member municipalities and other state and regional partners.

As in previous years, a UPWP Committee made up of representatives from the Board, the TAC, PAC, CWAC, VTrans, FHWA, and GMT will oversee the UPWP development process and provide a recommended work plan to the CCRPC Board. The CCRPC receives local, state and federal funds from a variety of sources to be used in various planning programs, and the UPWP Committee will determine the allocation of these diverse funds to best meet the objectives of the ECOS Plan. The UPWP development process will include input from the public, stakeholders, and our member communities.
